In accordance with our belief in the benefits of open access (free of price and access barriers), *Practical Academic Librarianship: The International Journal of the SLA Academic Division* applies the Creative Commons Attribution License (CCAL) to all works published. Readers are encouraged to become part of the change we seek in scholarly publishing and communication.

## **Think Piece**

One of the first goals of the recently formed Academic Division of the Special Libraries Association (SLA) was to develop an open access refereed journal focused on the practical side of academic librarianship. We recognized that, in order for this endeavor to succeed, our goal could not merely be to add yet another library-focused journal into the mix. Rather, we needed to develop a highly regarded, top-tier refereed journal that would provide some gravitas for our authors, many of whom are at tenure-granting institutions and regard peer-reviewed works as vital to the system of academic professional advancement. In the highly competitive journal environment, our goal is to attract both well-known reviewers and quality research papers to help build the reputation of our journal while advancing the course of knowledge in the field of academic librarianship.

In accordance with our belief in the benefits of free, open access journals, *Practical Academic Librarianship: The International Journal of the SLA Academic Division (PAL)* applies the Creative Commons Attribution License (CCAL) to all works we publish (read the summary at http://creativecommons.org/licenses/by/2.5 or the full license legal code at http://creativecommons.org/licenses/by/2.5/legalcode).

- Authors retain copyright and grant *Practical Academic Librarianship* right of first publication with the work simultaneously licensed under a Creative Commons Attribution License that allows others to read, download, reuse, reprint, modify, distribute, and/or copy the work with an acknowledgment of the work's authorship and initial publication in this journal.
- Authors are able to enter into separate, additional contractual arrangements for the
  non-exclusive distribution of the journal's published version of the work (e.g., post it
  to an institutional repository or publish it in a book), with an acknowledgement of
  its initial publication in this journal.

While many in our profession are in favor of the *concept* of open access, there is still a sense that to be a top journal you must have a prestigious publisher. However, we believe the most important consideration is not the publisher, but the quality of the peer review and we have recruited an exceptional review board. Combined with the reputation of SLA and the technical support of the Texas Digital Library, we believe that our colleagues will consider *Practical Academic Librarianship* a viable journal for distribution of their research results. In addition, we pledge to offer this service, which will provide wide access to all, at no cost to the
