AABP Keynote Speech Addresses Consumer Trust

In the 2020 Keynote Address, "Believe. Engage. Connect!", Amy te Plate-Church discussed consumer trust and what agriculture, including veterinarians, need to do to earn and build on that trust.

"Consumers trust farmers," te Plate-Church said. "But why are we sensing a distrust on how we produce food?" In Center for Food Integrity surveys, 55% of respondents said they strongly agree that if animals are treated decently and humanely, they have no problem consuming meat, milk and eggs. However, only 25% strongly agree that food animals are treated humanely. "Consumers want meat, milk and eggs from humanely treat animals, but they are not sure if the animals are treated humanely. Our message is not getting through."

What do we do about it? "People don't trust what they don't know," te Plate-Church continued. "They don't know ag. But people do know food, and they want to share about food." But how do we leverage that connection? She said 65% of consumers want to know more about farming and food processing. "If we don't fill that information void, we are leaving that open for others to fill."

She noted the top two concerns by consumers are about animal care and animal agriculture's effect on the environment. "We need to address those two concerns to speak about animal-based protein. Consumers trust farmers and veterinarians. We need to leverage that trust. It will take all of us to share individual stories about bringing safe and affordable food to consumers."

When someone asks questions about animal agriculture, te Plate-Church suggests a simple, three-step process: Listen, ask and share. Focus on the "Movable Middle" – the 65% of consumers who want to know more about farming. "Listen without judgement," she recommended. "Most people don't listen to understand, they listen to reply. Ask questions in a non-defensive manner. Try to find out the other person's view and their sources of information. Share your perspectives through shared values." Who you are is as important as what you know. "Consumers trust scientists, but they don't want a scientific explanation," adds te Plate-Church. "Lead with who you are and share relatable information. Consumers want to know that farmers and veterinarians truly care."

te Plate-Church ended with one of her favorite quotes from Theodore Roosevelt: "*No one cares how much you know until they know how much you care.*" Watch the keynote at https://www.aabp.org.

2020 AABP–Boehringer Ingelheim Bovine Practitioner of the Year

Dr. Calvin Booker described the AABP—Boehringer Ingelheim Bovine Practitioner of the Year Award. "The Bovine Practitioner of the Year Award has been awarded annually since its establishment in 1978. Since its inception, this award has been sponsored by Syntex Animal Health, Fort Dodge Animal Health, and now Boehringer Ingelheim. The award consists of a diamond ring and commemorative plaque. The award winner exhibits those qualities that exemplify the AABP and its members. Candidates are evaluated on the following criteria:

- Must be a bovine practitioner in active practice;
- The quality of veterinary service provided as judged by his or her peers;
- Participation in organized veterinary medicine, such as AABP, as well as activity on veterinary boards, such as licensing, specialty, etc.;
- Contribution to the knowledge of the profession through case reports, scientific reports and continuing education; and,
- Achievements and activities which have an impact on the cattle industry and bovine practice.

Presenting the 2020 Boehringer-Ingelheim Bovine Practitioner of the Year Award is Dr. Dean Christianson. "This year's Boeringer Ingelheim Vetmedica's practitioner of the year comes from a family of veterinarians. His mother was one of three females in a class of 150 and a successful broodmare practitioner. His father was an Irish horse trainer and rumor has it that our winner could ride even the toughest colts. Perhaps these experiences led to his preference for bovine work! Other veterinarians in the family include his wife, a sister and a son who will join our profession in 2023.

Our winner graduated from NCSU in 1988 and started his career at Battenkill Veterinary Clinic in NY. In 1991 he started Virginia Herd Health Services with his wife's used Isuzu Trooper and a used calf jack he got from Ben Harrington.

He has always embraced the use of the latest technologies even before they became popular including Ultrasound, Embryo transfer, IVF and genomics. This mentality has allowed him to remain on the cutting edge of bovine practice. As a breeder of Holstein genetics for over 25 years he has always emphasized sound feet and legs leading to increased longevity and quality of life for our dairy cattle. He also continually invests in new equipment to provide better and safer care for a wide variety of beef and dairy clients.

The AABP mentor of the year award could have easily been given to this veterinarian as well. He not only mentors students and new graduates in person, but also make great use of the internet and social media to educate and share information as well. He is a frequent contributor to AABP-L and The Vet Truck Facebook page.

He is truly a veterinarian's veterinarian. When time allows he does a lot of reading and constantly networks with colleagues to discuss cases and developments in veterinary medicine, yet he still makes time for family, friends and even a little bird hunting. So if someday you see a Bowie unit parked on an approach and off in the distance you see a guy walking up on a couple beautiful English Setters on point it could very well be this year's Boehringer Ingelheim Vetmedica's Bovine Practitioner of the year, Dr. Pat Comyn."

AABP—Boehringer-Ingelheim Awards for Excellence in Preventive Veterinary Medicine

The AABP—Boehringer-Ingelheim Excellence in Preventive Medicine Award for one beef and one dairy practitioner includes a plaque and a \$1500 scholarship to the college of veterinary medicine of the recipient's choice. The award was established in 1982 and previously sponsored by Merial. In 2017, Boehringer-Ingelheim became the sponsor of these awards. The awards recognize individual member practitioners that have developed outstanding preventive medicine programs.

Beef Award

Presenting the beef award is Dr. Dan Goehl. "The veterinarian we're honoring today with the AABP—Boehringer-Ingelheim Excellence in Preventive Medicine Award (Beef) owns and operates his own practice in Missouri, which he founded in 2010. He earned two degrees from the University of Missouri, the Bachelor of Science degree in Animal Science in 2004, and the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree in 2008. He works exclusively with beef producers,

providing cutting edge service to cow-calf and stocker operations. Our award winner has presented at both the AABP and AVC on chute-side record keeping; he was an early adapter of advanced record keeping to provide up-to-date management information to both clients and bovine practitioners. He has also served the profession on boards and committees for both the AABP and AVC. Multiple students have spent time at his veterinary practice in Tipton, MO, learning from real world experiences. He is a member of AABP, AVC, AVMA, SFT, and Missouri VMA. Our honoree lives on a small beef farm in California, MO with his wife, Julie, and their three children, Gage, Kade, and Avery. Dairy Award

Presenting the dairy award is Dr. Brandon Treichler. "It is with great pleasure that I am awarding the AABP—Boehringer-Ingelheim Excellence in Preventive Medicine Award (Dairy) to an individual who is very well deserving. This award goes to an individual member practitioner that has developed outstanding preventive medicine programs. The winner grew up in Michi-

gan and has spent his entire life

He graduated with his veterinary degree from MSU in 1979. He practiced in a primary dairy practice in Michigan and Ohio for 37 years. In 2010 he started his own consulting practice focusing on improving milk quality on dairy farms, which has taken him to 44 states as well as 4 countries internationally.

In 2011 he developed the Teaching Parlor which has been a huge asset to teaching veterinarians and industry people how to analyze milking equipment with the "hands on" approach. This contribution of his has been a positive tool that made Seminar 1 at AABP more effective.

In 2018 he went back to where it started and now is teaching veterinary students at MSU.

This year's winner is very active in AABP and NMC, but his real passion is teaching people how to help farmers improve their milk quality. He travels all over the USA pulling his Teaching Parlor.

AABP—Zoetis Distinguished Service Award

Dr. Calvin Booker described the award. "This award was established in 1989. Beginning in 1996, it has been given annually by Pfizer Animal Health, Inc., now Zoetis. It consists of a commemorative plaque and a certificate of appreciation. Candidates for the award are those individuals who, through long and continued service, have promoted the goals of the American Association of Bovine Practitioners (AABP), and whose accomplishments have served as a model for service to bovine agriculture through organized veterinary medicine. Selection criteria include the following:

- A career of self-effacing commitment to excellence in bovine medicine as evidenced by conscientious involvement in the affairs of the AABP;
- Demonstrated leadership in keeping organized veterinary medicine abreast of the times;
- Peer recognition as an effective spokesman for the bovine practitioner.

Presenting the Zoetis Distinguished Service Award is Dr. Christine Navarre. "This year's recipient's long list of accomplishments absolutely matches the criteria for this award but one of the more intangible traits listed stood out to me and that is "a career of self-effacing commitment". The recipient has a love of the veterinary profession, and bovine practice in particular, that has fueled an impressive record of humble service. Those that know this person will attest that they are not shy in giving their opinion, but when it comes to their motives they are unquestionably pure.

The recipient graduated in the 1980s and went into private mixed, mostly dairy practice first as an associate then as practice owner before returning to their alma mater to teach in the ambulatory section. They have been an AABP member right from the start and have a long record of service to AABP including numerous committees, and service as a district director.

But this person's service to the veterinary profession goes far beyond AABP. The recipient has served in numerous capacities with VMA's and agricultural organizations in two states and was awarded practitioner of the year in one state and recognized for significant contributions to veterinary medicine in another state. The recipient has also served in the AVMA house of delegates. Having an AABP member participate in the veterinary profession as a whole in this capacity is critical to keeping the issues of bovine practitioners front and center.

The recipient has been involved in community service, receiving a Certification for Service to Public Education and has received awards from community service and conservation groups.

Perhaps this recipient's greatest legacy is his long-standing commitment to mentorship of youth from grade school to veterinary school. One colleague shared that the recipient is more than just a food animal faculty member – they are a student advocate. The recipient continually promotes the importance of AABP membership and involvement in organized veterinary medicine. This recipient is also very passionate about teaching students about business, and personal finance management. The recipient's former students continue to reach out to him after graduation for advice on critical career and business decisions.

The recipient genuinely loves people, cattle and veterinary medicine and you just have to be around them for a few minutes to realize how much they love AABP. While they have served many organizations in many capacities, I know they consider AABP their home.

There are many great stories involving this recipient, some more civilized than others, but one stood out to me (this is likely to give it away). I quote, "I was attending my first awards banquet alone and I had no idea what district I was in or where I was supposed to sit. I must have looked completely lost, because this friendly bearded guy from Georgia dressed in a vest and dairy cow tie invited me to sit with him, even though I was a Yankee from another district, and took the time to introduce me to everyone and explain how AABP districts worked."

I am honored to call him a friend and fellow bovine practitioner and just this once in his honor I am going to say "Go MS State Bulldogs". I am pleased to announce this year's recipient of the AABP—Zoetis Distinguished Service Award, Dr. Jim Brett."

AABP Award of Excellence

Dr. Calvin Booker described the award. "This award was first established in 1989. Candidates for the award must be nominated from teaching, research, industry, or government areas. The nominees' professional activities must have had a consistent and direct influence on daily activities of veterinarians in bovine practice. Eligibility also includes a degree in veterinary medicine and AABP membership." Drs. Virginia Fajt and Sarah Wagner introduced the award recipient.

- **"VF:** It is our honor to introduce the winner of this year's AABP Award of Excellence, a person whose service to bovine medicine and influence on the daily activities of bovine practitioners make them highly deserving of this honor.
- SW: Agreed. How did you first meet this person?
- VF: I can't actually recall because it seems like I've known this person my whole veterinary career. I do have a memory of sitting at a table on a river boat with him at the AABP conference in St. Paul, which is a while back now. How did you meet him?
- **SW:** I first met him when I was a veterinary student at Michigan State doing an exchange program at the University of California Veterinary Medicine Teaching and Research Center in Tulare, California. What a great experience that was! He had been resident there after graduating from the Oklahoma State University College of Veterinary Medicine, then he stayed in California after the residency and was in private dairy practice for 7 years, then returned to the center at Tulare to get a PhD in epidemiology to teach us vet students a few things.

VF: He's done quite a bit of teaching! After he got his PhD, he returned to Oklahoma State where he was on the faculty of the college of veterinary medicine for 13 years. Ultimately he returned to Tulare, to take a leadership role in the center there.

He hasn't just taught veterinary students, though, he has also taught graduate students and residents, and he has been faculty sponsor for the preventive medicine boards. For folks who have graduated, he has presented CE essentially every year since his completion of his residency, and he has served on multiple conference planning committees.

SW: Now that you mention it, his commitment and service to the profession have been constant throughout his career. He has represented the AABP on the Council for Agricultural Science and Technology and on the Animal Agriculture Liaison Committee and the Committee on Antimicrobials of the AVMA, as well as working on multiple task forces and working groups in AABP. He has also served the American College of Veterinary Preventive Medicine on multiple committees.

But that's not all! He has served the bovine industry by giving testimony about the use of antimicrobial drugs in animals to state legislators, he has reviewed program submissions for the US Department of Agriculture, and he finds time to speak to local schools and 4H clubs about careers in veterinary medicine. It's a lot!

- VF: It really is. You can see the breadth of this person's influence in the support letters for his nomination: they included specialists in internal medicine, goat medicine, epidemiology and public health, and of course pharmacology. As one of his supporters wrote, this honoree's "thoughtful intellect, understanding of all perspectives, patient and enduring commitment to excellence, and sound ethical standards...have been the hallmark of his years of service to the veterinary profession.:"
- **SW:** That sounds like the person I know. I'm glad the award committee is recognizing him as the 2020 recipient of the AABP Award of Excellence—

SW and VF: Dr. Terry Lehenbauer!"

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AABP-Merck Animal Health Mentor of the Year Award

The Merck Animal Health Mentor of the Year Award is presented annually to an AABP member who has been engaged in the field of veterinary medicine for at least 25 years and has served as both advisor and role model to pre-veterinary and/ or veterinary students. This award was instituted in 2007 and is conferred annually to a member that embodies this spirit whether in practice, the clinic, or the classroom. The recipient is presented with a commemorative plaque and is provided complimentary meeting registration and lodging at the next annual conference.

Presenting the Merck Animal Health Mentor of the Year Award is Dr. Calvin Booker. "It is my honor to introduce this year's recipient of the AABP Merck Animal Health Mentor of the Year Award.

This recipient received their DVM from Western College of Veterinary Medicine in Saskatoon in 1973 and has been an active member of AABP ever since, including serving as a District Director for District 13 and President in 1992. This recipient was a founding member of the Western Canadian Association of Bovine Practitioners. As I reviewed this recipient's CV, with multiple pages of clinical trainees supervised, of honors and awards, and more multiples of pages of publications and presentations, that I noticed only went back 15 years, it just reaffirms this recipient's impact on not only the advancement of scientific knowledge but his impact on so many students, practitioners and researchers throughout Canada and the United States, myself included

A letter of support recalled this story: When this person received the Bovine Practitioner of the Year award in 1988, as one of the youngest to win this prestigious honor, their senior business partner at the time stated, 'If I was a sick cow; I would want this recipient to look after me.' Thirty-two years later; nothing has changed.

From current students:

'Even on the days where I feel like I'm not going to make it through school and am drowning in coursework, their smile and encouragement have been so contagious that it makes me excited to keep working towards the goal.'

'As a new graduate, I have called this recipient late at night and early in the morning only to hear happiness in their voice to hear from me while wondering what case has presented to me that day.'

'This recipient's passion for not only teaching but also the veterinary industry and Holstein industry is evident by their work ethic and devotion to all facets that he is involved in. ... From a professional and industry perspective, this recipient exemplifies the type of veterinarian most bovine veterinarians aim to be.'

'Though all of their accolades are too numerous to list, perhaps the most exceptional is their personal commitment and dedication to each and every student and his willingness to go the extra mile to help them achieve their goals.'

'A mentor is someone who is supposed to provide guidance and support for their mentee to thrive in their future career. For most of us, this recipient exceeds these expectations. ... This recipient is always willing to take the time during their busy days and give advice and extra knowledge to help out anyone.'

AABP James A. Jarrett Award for Young Leaders

The James A. Jarrett Award for Young Leaders, named after the second Executive Vice President of AABP, recognizes members of the American Association of Bovine Practitioners who have made significant contributions to ensuring the current success and the future viability of the organization. The award will consist of a commemorative plaque and ring or pin. This award was established in 2005 and will be presented only when a deserving individual has been nominated and selected. The James A. Jarrett Award for Young Leaders is limited to deserving AABP members who have graduated within the previous ten years from veterinary school. Recipients will have given extraordinary service to the AABP in a manner that significantly enhances the mission of the organization.

Presenting the James A. Jarrett Award for Young Leaders is Dr. Roger Thomson. "It is my pleasure to present the James A. Jarrett Award for Young Leaders. This award recognizes a young veterinarian that ensures the success of AABP. This year's winner meets and exceeds that goal. This year's winner grew up on a small family farm in Eastern Pennsylvania.
