
AFA 14th Annual Convention

Parrots & Pirates in Tropical Tampa

August 2nd through 7th, 1988

Florida was acquired from Spain in 1821 and contains the country's oldest permanent settlement, St. Augustine. The "sunshine state" nickname was adopted officially in 1970.

The manatee, or sea cow, is the Florida state marine mammal. There are fewer than 1,000 manatees remaining in existence, and protecting the mammals is an important cause.

The state bird is the mockingbird. State flower is the orange blossom, adopted in 1909. State fish is the largemouth bass (freshwater) and Atlantic sailfish (saltwater). State song is Stephen Foster's "Old Folks at Home," and was adopted by the Florida legislature in 1935. Foster's "Swanee River" is actually Florida's Suwannee River.

Tampa by the Bay is ranked among the top ten all-around best vacation destinations in America. Tampa's many attractions include one of Florida's most visited family theme parks. At Busch Gardens, you can explore the Serengeti Plain, Morocco, the Congo and Timbuktu. There are also plenty of thrill rides, shows and games that offer hours of entertainment for the whole family. For the bird enthusiasts, Busch Gardens has several trained bird shows, a wide variety of exotic birds on display throughout the park for your viewing pleasure, a new exhibit of raptors and, if one is visiting during breeding season, you can view baby birds in the brooder nursery.

Right next door to Busch Gardens is Adventure Island, where you and your family can spend the day splashing and frolicking at a wild water playground. During your stay you can spend a quiet day exploring Tampa's heritage with a stroll through the historic district of Ybor City where Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders rode through on their way to Cuba and where cigars are still made by hand just as they were a century ago.

Tampa's social calendar is filled with festivals and events that span the seasons. There's the annual Gasparilla Festival, when swashbuckling costumes, revelry, parades and fireworks are the order of the day. To carry on the pirate tradition, Tampa is also noted for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, and our newly constructed cross city highway is known as the Tampa Crosstown Expressway with a sign depicting a pirate. Hence our logo "Parrots & Pirates in Tropical Tampa."

If you are staying at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, AFA's convention headquarters, you will be minutes away from Franklin Street Mall featuring a variety of shops and restaurants, and just across the bay by way of the "people mover" you can visit Tampa's new Harbour Island for a festival of food, fun, shopping and live entertainment.

Tampa's climate and location make it the perfect place for all kinds of outdoor activities and water recreation. There's something for everyone, from avid anglers to enthusiastic golfers. For the sports fan, Tampa offers a whole year's worth of major sporting events. Baseball fans can catch a preview of the Cincinnati Reds during spring training, while football fans can cheer the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and the Hall of Fame Bowl in the fall. Also, Tampa's

cultural climate is ideal all year round. You'll find everything from concerts, plays, and ballets to art galleries and science museums featuring hands-on exhibits.

We are proud to announce the opening of the new Lowry Park Zoological Garden. The old city-owned zoo opened in the 1930s and was in a very bad state of decline. However, August 1982, the Lowry Park Zoo Association explored the potential of public/private partnership for renovation. Thanks to thousands of native Floridians we are proud to present you with a zoo designed for "the good life for the animals." Lowry Park Zoo has many beautiful and rare species of birds on exhibit and their free flight aviary should be a priority on your tour list.

Tampa by the Bay is your gateway to fun, your gateway to sun. We've even made getting here as easy as possible via Tampa International Airport which is one of the most convenient and efficient airports in the world. We also have an excellent network of highways that link Tampa with all other major Florida cities and cruise lines making ports of call in the Caribbean and Mexico. Whatever the season, there's always a reason to discover the many facets of Tampa's personality.

One of the major reasons to visit Tampa is the 14th annual convention of the American Federation of Aviculture. During our fun in the sun, we all must make a commitment — to further our knowledge in aviculture. Terry Dunham, St. Petersburg, Florida, will talk about neophemas and Australian finches.

Veterinarian Seminar August 7, 1988

This year our Sunday veterinarian lecture program is chaired by Dr. Susan Clubb who has done an outstanding job of choosing topics and speakers for our convention programs in the past. With more and more aviculturists actively entering into a captive breeding program of exotic birds, occasionally a disease problem arises. Dr. Clubb recognizes a need for the aviculturists to expand their knowledge in the prevention and control of diseases and has brought together an outstanding group of speakers for our 14th annual convention in Tampa, Florida.

The title of the veterinarian program is "Control of Diseases Important to Aviculture: A Program for Veterinarians and Aviculturists." To date, the following persons have confirmed and will be speaking at our veterinarian seminar program during the convention: Susan Clubb, D.V.M.; Jack Gaskins, D.V.M.; David Graham, D.V.M.; Walter Rosskopf, D.V.M.

Plan to attend the Sunday veterinarian program lectures. You can register to attend the entire convention or choose the days you wish to attend. You will find a convention registration form located elsewhere in this magazine. For those of you who attend the Sunday lectures you will receive a written transcript as part of your registration fee.

- 2. Photo Subject birds.
- 3. Categories & Prizes CATEGORIES: a) black & white prints; b) transparencies; c) color prints. PRIZES: 1st place - \$100; 2nd place - \$75; 3rd place - \$50; and special merit - \$15.
- 4. Print Size minimum 5" x 7"; not to exceed 16" x 20".
- 5. Print Mounting all prints to be mounted on mattboard with minimum 1" border on all four sides. White mounting preferred, but black or any complimentary pastel acceptable.
- 6. Label & Identify Entries all entries are to be titled, identifying species of birds whenever possible. All entries must bear the photographer's name, full address, and phone number on the back.
- 7. Deadline Entries must be received by JULY 15, 1988.
- 8. Disposition of Entries entries will be returned no later than 30 days after date of judging, provided a selfaddressed envelope or label, along with correct postage, is included. All entries without return postage become the property of the Watchbird. Winning entries, special merit and honorable mention will be held until published in the Watchbird.
- 9. Judging will occur before the annual AFA convention banquet. Winners will be announced at the banquet. All entries will be displayed at the convention.
- 10. Entry Fee \$1.00 for each entry. Three entries allowed per category and no more than nine overall.
- 11. Liability all efforts will be made to protect photographic material submitted. However, AFA is not responsible for any accidental damage or loss incurred during handling or while on display.
- 12. Shipping & Handling Protection all transparencies must be enclosed between glassine sheets or folders to prevent damage.

Transportation Tips to Convention Site

The Hyatt Regency Tampa, Two Tampa City Center, is six miles from Tampa International Airport. The hotel offers transportation to and from the airport. When you arrive at the airport look for the courtesy telephone for the Hyatt Regency (specify downtown site) and let the hotel know you have arrived and need transportation. For those of you driving, there are three major interstate access roads to downtown Tampa — I-4, I-275 and I-75. All of these interstates meet in an interchange which is downtown Tampa. Take the Ashley Street exit from I-275, stay on Ashley Street. You will pass the Curtis Hixon Convention Center on your right. Make a left on Jackson Street. Hotel is located one block over on the corner of Jackson and Tampa Street.

Long term parking is available at the Fort Brooke Parking Garage which is located two blocks south of the hotel on Whiting Street. There is an enclosed walk-way from the garage into Tampa City Center (located on third level). You can walk into Tampa City Center and make a left in the lobby, go through another walk-way overlooking the shopping mall, and arrive on the second floor of the Hyatt Regency Hotel. Convention meeting rooms will be on your left.

Tours Available While Attending the AFA 14th Annual Convention

Suncoast Seabird Sanctuary, Indian Shores, FL — The sanctuary receives 5,000 sick, injured and orphaned wild birds annually and maintains some 400 permanently crippled birds for education, research, and captive breeding. The tour consists of the hospital/laboratory, recuperation, and rehabilitation areas as well as the housing facilities of the resident birds.

Discovery Island, Walt Disney World — Discovery Island is an 11 acre sanctuary where animals roam free, and man can touch the spirit of nature. Over 90 species of animals and 250 species of plants inhabit this natural island. Exotic animals, reptiles and birds, some threatened with extinction, thrive in this tropical haven. Visiting Discovery Island is an adventure of the mind and spirit. Walk the shady paths and discover for yourself a world of rare beauty where quiet is broken by the majestic call of a trumpeter swan or the comedic laugh of a kookaburra. One of the world's largest walk-through aviaries brings birds and visitors close together.

Sea World, Penguin Encounter — A realistic world of ice shelves, changing seasons and snow. And it's home to more than 200 comical, agile, endearing little penguins in nature's own tuxedos. Plus, it's a whole flurry of puffins and other Arctic seabirds. While at Sea World, catch Clyde and Seamore in the sea lion and otter show. And don't miss Cap'n Kids' World, a playland just for the young. And where else can you experience the incredible wonder of Baby Shamu, the first killer whale ever to be born and thrive in the care of man? Step up and feed a friendly dolphin. Reach out and pet a lively ray. Shake hands — or flippers — with the ''stars'' of Sea World's shows.

Busch Gardens, The Dark Continent, Tampa — A 300 acre entertainment center inspired by Africa of yesteryear. Thrill rides, live entertainment, shops, restaurants, games and the fourth largest zoo in America.

Lowry Park Zoo, Tampa – Featuring a 180,000 square foot structure which includes two main flight greas, four smaller units and an observation tower that enables people to climb into different areas of bird activity. The aviary includes waterfowl, ground dwellers and free flying birds. The entire area is filled with dense vegetation and a variety of water exhibits. Toward the rear of the aviary is the nursery and bird rearing building where visitors can watch young birds in heated brooders through glass windows. The zoo also features an Asian Domain containing nine species of native Asian mammals and two species of large birds. 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
